He also revealed to me the fans in the roof. I have so much to get to know; this is nothing like having city water and being hooked to the sewer system.

I am also getting to know how the congregation functions. I now have this 11" X 17" flow chart sitting on my office counter, not to mention a job description book beside it. I've read a few of the written policies; there aren't too many. I have to complete the work needed for the child protection policy. I am learning who does what, and how does it get done, and by when does it get done – ideally.

I am also getting to know the building. Just this week I discovered unknown stairwells leading into the depths of hidden rooms. Are they the Air Hill catacombs? What a labyrinth! I have not yet explored the attic. What will I find? I still have much to learn.

More importantly, I am getting to know the Air Hill family. I am beginning to put names and faces together. I am beginning to know who goes with who. No, I have not even begun to grasp who is related to whom. I am not Julie Andrews from the King and I, but I concur with her sentiment from the song "Getting To Know You":

Admittedly, you might not be tea drinkers, but you know what I mean.

General Assembly Report

Conference Report
July 13- 16, 2018
Palmer Hall in the High Center, Messiah College, Grantham, PA

Thank you for sending Charles and I to the General Assembly of the Brethren in Christ US 2018.

The General Assembly in the past was called General Conference. Now General Conference US applies to the United States Regional Conferences. For over 100 years Canada and US were one General Conference. Recently they have been separated because of laws and finances, so General Assembly refers to the business and inspirational meeting of the delegates from the six Regional Conferences of the Brethren in Christ Conference US. Each of the Regional Conferences has a representative on the General Conference Board. Donald Shenk completed his term as representative for Allegheny Conference and Sherri Flohr from the Five Forks Church is his successor. Rachel Diaz, a bilingual attorney from Florida, and Emerson Lesher, CEO of Lifeways/Messiah Village for 18 years, chaired the business sessions.

The Theme of the General Assembly was: To Know, Love & Follow Jesus. The first session began Friday evening at 7:00 o'clock and the last session concluded Monday afternoon with communion led by Bishop Perry Engle. Dave Hershberger arranged and led the worship teams. Frances Drost played the piano for the evening sessions.

Each evening session the message highlighted a phrase of the theme. Friday evening, Former Bishop Danisa Ndlovu from Africa delivered the message "To Know Jesus" He said, "Do we Google Jesus, or try to get to know him through Facebook?" If we really know Jesus it will change our life. Saturday evening National Director Alan Robinson spoke on: "To Love Jesus". To love Jesus we must love our brother otherwise Jesus said we are a liar. Sunday evening Scott McKnight spoke on: "To Follow Jesus". Jesus said, "Take up your cross and follow me." To follow Jesus is to walk to the cross. The cross of our own will submitted to his righteous will.

Testimonials called "God at work" portrayed God's work among us. The Assembly sessions were live streamed but went off line, when our missionary from a country that is 95% Muslim, told of the training she and her husband are doing to raise up Christian leaders. Christian families often do not get an education since they work in the brick kilns from childhood to death to help support their families. Pastors are trained to hold school in the churches to educate the children so they can get jobs that provide for their families.

The business of Assembly is to approve minutes, receive reports, to vote on recommendations and debate issues just like we do at our January Council. In our Council this year we voted to repeal the Constitution. Two thirds of the churches of General Conference US needed to vote in favor for it to be repealed. Seventy-five percent of the churches agreed to the repeal, so with the vote at the Assembly, it has now been repealed. It is replaced by the By-laws and Manual of Doctrine and Government. In the past faith and practice terms were mingled with legal terms.

A recommendation was brought to insert a sentence in the Articles of Faith and Practice to state: Our forefathers stood in the stream of historic Christianity mediated through the Protestant Reformation especially the Radical Reformation. It was approved and will come to General Assembly 2020 for final approval.

The Church Pension Fund was underfunded so in 2016 a campaign: Honor the Past: Build for the Future began to raise the necessary funding. A donor offered matching funds and by the time the Assembly met, the Pension Fund was fully funded. Mitch Martin from the BIC Pension Fund was moved to tears in gratitude as he reported the funding. An offering taken two evenings amounted to nearly \$11,000 to fund future initiatives that will also be matched.

The only ballot vote was on the recommendation to elect Alan Robinson to serve a second term as National Director. It passed easily.

Bible Quizzing has been an exciting part of Conference/Assembly for many years. The final quiz of the Youth Bible Quizzing ended the Assembly in Palmer Hall on Monday evening. They met in other areas throughout the General Assembly sessions. Nine Church teams quizzed using double elimination in which a team had to lose twice to be eliminated. Monday night Dillsburg Church with no loses faced Nappanee, IN. Nappanee had one loss from losing to Dillsburg earlier in the weekend. Nappanee won the first quiz, so each came to the final quiz with one loss. Dillsburg lost again in the second quiz. Messiah College gives a \$1,000 certificate to each member of the winning team, to the highest quizzer of each team and to a few other categories. These are redeemable when the person enrolls as a student at Messiah. One quizzer received three certificates! Several were young enough they will wait years to redeem theirs, while one young man is a student already.

This year for the first time six teams of adults: former quizzers, quiz team leaders or other people who joined a team, and quizzed on Sunday afternoon at the Grantham Church. Julie Heisey, daughter of Ray and Mim Heisey of Roxbury, PA, who had been in Rwanda for the past year, is home and was on the winning team.
