AIR HILL STATEMENT OF PURPOSE

"To Follow Jesus Christ through the Wind of the Holy Spirit"

I just completed a book at the end of December called, "Mirror to the Church." Emmanuel Katongole wrote this book about the Rwandan genocide in 1994 in which 800,000 people who were identified as Tutsi or moderate Hutu were murdered by the Hutus. Let me give you a brief glimpse into this tragedy through a couple quotes:

The Rwandans who killed one another in 1994 were not ancient tribal enemies who had been at odds for generations. They were neighbors who spoke the same language, lived in the same villages – even married one another, as my parents did. How do people who are in almost every way alike learn to see one another as enemies?... Javan Sebasore, a genocide survivor from the village of Muisozi, tells the story of hiding in a small building beside the church in his village. From his hiding place, he listened as the interahumwe slaughtered his neighbors in the nearby church. 'The people started shouting out, 'havyaramanna, so of so and so, you are killing us, '" Sebasore remembers. The victims knew their killers. "They would call out to their killers by name ask, 'Why do you kill us?'"

Let's throw in one other factor, Rwanda was 85% Christian. Christians were killing other Christians. Christians were killing fellow church members.

When a Catholic cardinal visited Rwanda on behalf of the pope in 1994, he asked the assembled church leaders," Are you saying that the blood of tribalism is deeper than the waters of baptism?" One leader answered, "Yes, it is."

This is the challenge. This is what the Rwandan genocide exposes for the global church to recognize. Christian expression throughout the world has too easily allowed the blood of tribalism to flow deeper than the waters of baptism.

Who are you?
Where do you find your identity?
Is your identity in Jesus Christ, or is it in something else?

As we begin a new year, this is something we really need to consider. Last year we saw people leave churches over Republican vs. Democrat, vaccinated vs. unvaccinated, masked vs. unmasked, and so much more? The church experienced division, not over Jesus Christ, but over politics. What does that tell you? Our identity is not based on Jesus Christ.

This book was written before last year; it was written in 2009. However, Emmanuel Katongole is holding up the Rwandan genocide as a mirror for the church to gaze, because we too might be heading the same direction. Where do you and I find our identity?

But our identities are never simple reflections. All identities are formed over time and shaped by the stories we live into. This is why memory is so important. We can never begin to imagine a new future for ourselves until we find ways to remember ourselves differently.

The church's mission, then, is not so much rooted in some future that we've yet to achieve as it is in remembering God's new creation, which Jesus embodied when he rose from the dead. Our mission is to be a new community that bears witness to the fact that in Christ there is a new identity.

We are not Steeler fans or Lion fans. We are not maskers or non-maskers. We are not Americans or Canadians or Mexicans. We are not Republicans or Democrats or Libertarians. We are not even white or black or male or female. (Gal. 3:28)

No, Jesus is our way and our truth and our life. He is our king above any other king or ruler. He created us. He sustains us. He has saved us from our bondage to sin. He has raised us and brought us new life – a new life that lasts forever. In him we are to find our identity.

As you begin this new year, may you increasingly define yourself by your relationship with Jesus Christ.

<u>VAN PROJECT</u> Your generous cash contributions and ongoing pledge commitments have met our fundraising goal through our current term (Aug 2023) of church planting with Brethren in Christ U.S. World Missions. With these funds secured, we have now turned our attention towards raising funds for upgrading a vehicle for ongoing ministry.
